Thank you for your interest in New Hope School. We are dedicated to academic excellence, character education, and partnership among home, school and community. The application procedure is as follows:

- Submit the following documents:
 Complete application form with nonrefundable \$50 application fee
 Student essay (for applicants to middle school)
 Copy of latest report card
 Copy of latest standardized test scores
 (B6T) Application for Private School Transportation
 Immunization records
- 2. If space is available, and the student/school match seems appropriate, the student and parents/guardians are invited for a personal interview so that an informal assessment of the student may be conducted. Applicants for 6th-8th grades are required to take an admissions test.
- 3. The Admissions Committee reviews the student's file and test results. A written notice is sent of acceptance or rejection.
- 4. If the student is accepted, the remaining enrollment forms must be completed and submitted to the school within two weeks of acceptance or before the student's first day of attendance, whichever comes first.
- 5. A mandatory orientation meeting will be held for all new students and their parents/guardians soon after the start of the fall term as part of our Back-to-School Night (date and time to be announced).



SCHOOL PLEDGE

The above pledge, which students recite every morning after the Pledge of Allegiance, reflects New Hope School's commitment to helping its students develop their full potential as God's children. We believe that the cultivation of their heart and conscience as well as instruction in moral and ethical norms through the promotion of universal values are the foundation for all of their subsequent education and is the key to healthy character development.

Such education best takes place in an environment of love. True love, rooted in the heart and conscience, is intimately connected to universal principles, which have been the foundation of every civilized society. These principles in turn are related to three basic life goals: 1) becoming a person of mature character; 2) building loving relationships with others, especially in marriage between husband and wife, and family; and 3) contributing to the health and prosperity of the natural and human environment in which one lives as the foundation for a peaceful world.

Character education necessarily raises the question of purpose and meaning. The three life goals mentioned above provide a comprehensive framework through which educating for character can be effectively understood and implemented. New Hope School's character education program seeks to support the spiritual and moral development of its students as a foundation for their eventual fulfillment of these three life goals. Elements of this program include moral reflection and discipline, service learning, and teaching conflict resolution skills as effective tools in building character.

The teachers of the school are committed to creating a loving moral and peaceful atmosphere in the classroom as a foundation to the success of this program. They understand their role as secondary parent, role model and mentor to their students. Thus, they seek to maintain a parental heart in the classroom.

The school works to integrate heavenly values into all aspects of the curriculum. Beginning with a 30-minute class meeting each day, and passing through lessons in mathematics, science, history/social studies, literature, and others, teachers look for opportunities to teach good values to their students. Even on the playground, students are encouraged to engage in cooperative team play during their recess period, show respect for each other, take responsibility for their behavior, and help and serve one another.

The basis of New Hope School's character education program is the *Discovering the Real Me* curriculum, created by the Universal Peace Federation (UPF). Some of the supplemental materials used are *My Journey in Life*, developed by the International Educational Foundation (IEF), *Wiseskills*, *Kids With Character*, a literature-based program developed by the Heartwood Institute, *The Book of Virtues*, and others.

- All tuition and other fees may be subject to increases each year.

Other Fees

- Registration Fee: A \$100 non-refundable registration fee per child is due by August 1. Applications
 for new students should be submitted with a \$50 non-refundable fee, with the balance due by
 August 1, in the case of acceptance.
- 2. Book Fee: There is an annual \$300 book fee per child. This fee may be paid in full in August or will be billed in ten monthly amounts of \$30 starting in August.

Fundraising

New Hope School asks that the family of each student contribute a minimum of \$200 to the school through various fundraisers during the school year. Such fundraisers help us to keep the tuition low as the cost of utilities, books, equipment, materials and salaries spiral upward.

As a small gesture of appreciation, New Hope School will award any family a 5% discount on the tuition after a student of a new family that you have introduced has been attending the school for 3 months.


We also offer a PAID in FULL discount of 5% if Full Tuition is paid by Sept 1st of the school year.

Other class meetings to foster inclusion and belonging


Classroom system of recognizing and rewarding positive behavior

Student of the month to acknowledge positive actions


Training students in problem solving and peaceful conflict resolution


Ongoing training for school staff in positive discipline

All parents are expected to review this *School Code of Conduct* together with their children. Teachers will be referring to it throughout the school year. This document will be available on the school website for your reference.







School Rules

In order to facilitate this partnership, we ask parents to join the students and staff members in studying the New Hope School's Code of Conduct.

Academic Integrity

In the pursuit of academic excellence, students are expected to invest themselves sincerely in both their classwork and homework. They are expected to do their own work (unless the project involves group work and collaboration) without any cheating (copying from someone else or passing off someone else's work as their own. The latter involves not plagiarizing another person's material but to give credit by citing another's work if including it in one's own work.


Discipline Policy

Emphasizing prevention rather than cure, New Hope School's character education program will provide an environment that will naturally limit the need for corrective discipline. When it does become necessary, discipline will focus on the specific behavior, taking into account the child's motivation. When mistakes are made, they will be firmly but lovingly corrected. All disciplinary issues will be documented and submitted to the Principal for review.

Students will be expected to conform to the school's rules, moral standards, and social expectations. When they make mistakes, in disciplining them they will be treated with kindness and respect as children of God. There will be no corporal punishment, abusive language, ridicule, or harsh, humiliating or ostracizing treatment.

Basic Rules of Behavior

1. Students shall be courteous and respectful towards teachers, school staff and each









other at all times.

- 2. Students are expected to respect the authority of teachers and school staff.
- 3. The following behaviors are unacceptable at New Hope School:
 - a. Fighting between students
 - b. Hitting and pushing other students
 - c. Stealing and cheating
 - d. Bad language
 - e. Ridiculing or bullying other students
 - f. Destruction of school property or the personal property of others

Playground Rules

- 1. Get permission at all times from the playground monitor to enter the building.
- 2. Always play safely. Any activity that may harm a fellow student is not allowed. If you are not sure whether an activity is safe or not, ask the playground monitor.
- 3. Report accidents promptly to a playground monitor.
- 4. No standing or jumping off benches or picnic tables.
- 5. Do not throw rocks, sticks, or any other objects other than playground balls.
- 6. Do not kick the basketballs.
- 7. Notify a playground monitor immediately if you find any glass or other dangerous objects on the ground. Do not pick up!
- 8. Do not throw or kick balls or other objects over the fence. If it happens, you must sit down for 10 minutes.
- 9. If a ball goes over the fence, get a playground monitor to retrieve it. Do not get it yourself.
- 10. When a playground monitor calls for students to go inside, everyone must stop what they are doing and line up before the door.


Building Rules

- 1. Be orderly and quiet while walking in the hallway, being aware of classes in session.
- 2. Gum is not allowed anywhere on school property, either inside or outside.
- 3. Do not eat while walking in the hallway. Wait until you are in the eating area (lunchroom, classroom, or outside) before eating.
- 4. If an adult or younger student is using a doorway that you wish to use, stop and wait.
- 5. Students should be in the bathrooms only to use the toilets or sinks and respect the privacy of others. No hanging out.
- 6. Bathroom rules:
 - Keep clean: pick up paper towels off the floor, no splashing soap or water
 - No throwing toilet paper on the ceiling
 - Throw paper towels in the wastebasket, not on the floor













- No standing on toilet seats
- Do not turn off the light when someone is still in the bathroom
- Do not lock stall doors if no one is inside
- Wash hands with soap and water after using the toilet
- Don't forget to turn off the water

Classroom Rules

- Come prepared with pens/pencils, papers, books, and any other materials needed for class.
- 2. Enter and leave the classroom in a quiet, orderly manner.
- 3. Use the restroom and water fountain only between classes, not during.
- 4. Do not close the classroom door if no teacher is present.
- 5. Do not be in a classroom before or after school or during recess without a teacher's permission. Do not hang out in the hallway before or after school.
- 6. Generally follow established classroom rules.

Lunch & Recess Rules


- 1. Come quietly with your class to lunch. The responsible student for that week should bring out the trash can.
- 2. Sit while eating lunch, not standing or walking around.
- 3. Remain seated until dismissed by the teacher.
- 4. Finish your lunch before playing.
- 5. Do not sit in or block an area where other students are playing.
- 6. Do not take a ball that other students are playing with.
- 7. Responsible students for the week should put away the trash can, clean the tables and floor, and push in chairs.
- 8. When it's time to go in, put all balls in the bucket and take all personal belongings with you. Do not leave lunch boxes, sweaters, or coats outside.


General Rules

- Greeting and Manners: Students will respond to an adult's greeting by looking him/her in the eye and speaking clearly: "Good morning (afternoon), Mr. (s).
 ______." Students, remaining seated, will greet visitors to their classroom when cued by their teacher: "Good morning (afternoon), Mr. (s).
 ______.
 Students will use polite words like "please" and "thank you" when speaking with adults and each other throughout the day.
- 2. *Class Dismissal:* Dismissal is not based on the time on the clock. Only the responsible teacher can dismiss a class. Wait until the teacher has dismissed you before lining up.














- 3. New Hope School is a closed facility. Students may not leave school rounds at any time during school hours.
- 4. Other guidelines and rules may be implemented based on the discretion of the administration and teachers.

Student Dress Code


- 1. Students must wear school uniforms purchased through the *Cookies* website, including gym t-shirts.
- 2. Any shirt worn under the school shirt must be white. Its sleeves must not be longer than the school shirt.
- 3. Girls may wear only white or blue leggings or tights under their skirts or shorts.
- 4. Other than the school name, no writing, decorations, pictures, or company logos may adorn students' clothing.
- 5. Hoodies, hats, or coats may not be worn inside the building.
- 6. If a student forgets his/her school sweater and is cold, he/she may borrow a sweater from the office for the day.
- 7. Coloring of hair and unusual hairstyles are not permitted.
- 8. Girls may wear modest earrings to school. No other type of jewelry is permitted.
- 9. Fingernail polish is not permitted.
- 10. Tattoos or other markings on the skin are not permitted.
- 11. School uniforms are not required on dress-down days. However, clothing should be modest, neat, clean, and not torn. Parents will be informed about such days.
- 12. All school clothing should be labeled with the student's name so that it may be returned to the proper person if lost or misplaced.
- 13. Students coming to school with improper clothing will be reported to the office and parents notified to bring a change of clothes. Such students will not be allowed to attend classes until properly dressed.

Part II: Consequences of Student Misbehavior

Level 1: This level can be handled by the classroom teacher or another teacher who may be involved. Frequent misbehavior will be referred to the Principal.


Examples:

- Dress code violations
- Classroom disturbances
- Bullying/teasing/name-calling
- Rude or disrespectful comments
- Lying
- Lightly hitting or pushing













Disobeying, arguing with, or talking back to staff

Consequences: Depending on the severity of the misbehavior, a warning may be all that is required. Repeated misbehavior may result in denial of certain privileges or separation from other students.

Level 2: This level involves actions which pose a threat to the safety of others. Such misbehavior will involve immediate removal from the situation and referral to the Principal.

Examples:

- Cheating, stealing
- Damage of school property*
- Cursing or other vulgar language
- Physically assaulting another person (hitting, punching, kicking, choking, spitting, etc.)
- Cyberbullying inside or outside of school
- Repeated Level 1 misbehavior

Consequences: Referral to the Principal, meeting with parents, denial of privileges, possible suspension or expulsion

*Students and their families are financially responsible for the cost of replacing or repairing damaged school property.

Level 3: Any action considered to be a misdemeanor or felony in the eyes of the law. Examples:


- Setting a fire
- Stealing school or students' personal property
- Threatening to bring or bringing a weapon to school
- Verbally or physically assaulting any staff person

Consequences: Immediate referral to the Principal, meeting with parents, suspension, expulsion, referral to the police. A student may be placed on probation for a relatively serious offense or for continued misbehavior. He/she may be suspended or expelled for serious misbehavior, whether at the school or elsewhere.

In all the above cases, the school reserves the right to make final decisions based on the best interests of the school and its students.


Electronics & Cell Phones

Students are not permitted to bring electronic devices or games to school. They may bring cell phones but are not permitted to use them during school hours. They should be













turned off and stored in students' backpacks. If necessary, a student may use his/her phone only with permission from his/her teacher. Otherwise, if an electronic device or cell phone is seen during school hours, it will be placed in the Principal's office. It is the parent's responsibility to pick up the device at the end of the school day. The device will not be returned to the student directly. New Hope School will not be held liable for replacement or financial reimbursement should a device be lost, damaged, or stolen while at the school.

Traffic Safety & Security

- 1. When entering and exiting the parking lot, please drive slowly, watching out for children.
- 2. Keep your child(ren) with you when you park in the lot and walk him/her/them safely to the playground area. Do not permit them to dart across the lot unaccompanied.
- 3. When you enter the front door, do not let anyone else in with you unless you know who the person is.

Summary

If students violate the *School Code of Conduct*, there will be consequences to those actions depending on the type of misbehavior. Possible consequences include:

- Being corrected by a teacher or other staff member
- Loss of privileges, such as not eating lunch with classmates or recess
- Parents being informed
- Meeting with parents
- Having to apologize to anyone affected by the student's action
- Being sent to the main office or Principal's office
- Replacing or paying the cost for any property or material damaged
- Cleaning the school or performing some other school service
- Suspension or expulsion from school

As a member of the New Hope School community, by signing the *Enrollment Agreement*, it is expected that you agree to and will support your child to follow all the rules and accept the consequences as stated in the *School Code of Conduct*.

Recent Graduate Testimonies About Their Experience at New Hope School

"I attended New Hope School from first through fourth grades after which my parents transferred me to public school. In seventh grade, I asked my parents if I could go back to New Hope because I did not like the atmosphere in the middle school where I was with the boy-girl pressures. I did not like the direction my friends were going in. The atmosphere at New Hope School is much more family-like. Boys and girls respect each other and feel more like brothers and sisters.
